Ordinance Amendment (BOA) 2020-4 will \$1,847,944.00 across several annually budgeted funds for outstanding purchase orders and contracts; \$22,493.00 in the General Fund for unspent donation proceeds; and \$2,221,545.00 for specific items for which funding was assigned (designated) for the General Fund at the close of fiscal year 2018-2019 (FY 19). Funding for these expenditures was included or available in the FY 19 budget or was included in future fiscal year funding plans. These appropriations will primarily be funded by fund balance or net asset appropriations for the various funds; the only exception being \$53,972.00 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the State of North Carolina under a 75 percent/25 percent share for outstanding hurricane recovery purchase orders at June 30, 2019. A portion of the funds assigned (designated) in the General Fund is for expenditures for the Transit, Parking and Solid Waste Funds. Those funds (\$337,159.00) are included in BOA 2020-4 as recommended General Fund transfers and operating budget expenditures for the noted funds. In addition, \$32,000.00 is proposed to be appropriated for one of the Transit Fund designation items that is eligible for Federal grant reimbursement. For the County Parks and Recreation District, a total of \$128,394.00is recommended to be appropriated from fund balance restricted for the District at the close of FY 19 for open purchase orders (\$97,152.00) and for vehicle and equipment replacements that were funded in FY 19 but were not completed by June 30, 2019 (\$31,242.00). Additional appropriations are also proposed for \$200,000.00 for Hurricane Florence recovery project management services for the General Fund that are eligible for 75 percent/25 percent FEMA/State funding; \$27,500.00 for joint repairs for the Franklin Street Parking Deck to be funded by Parking Fund balance reserved for capital maintenance; \$7,911.00 for computer equipment purchases for Stormwater operations to be funded from net assets; and \$1,556.00 for production of Safety Handbooks to be funded by Risk Management Fund net assets.

6.04 Adoption of Special Revenue Fund Project Ordinance 2020-6 to Appropriate Grant Proceeds for Adaptive Sports Programs for Disabled Veterans and Members of the Armed Forces

The City has received notification of a \$20,000.00 grant award from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs through its Adaptive Sports Programs for Disabled Veterans and Members of the Armed Forces grant program. Funding from this grant will be used to purchase equipment for the creation of an adaptive cycling program, to be offered through Fayetteville-Cumberland Parks and Recreation (FCPR).

Staff is seeking authorization to accept the grant award and Council adoption of Special Revenue Fund Project Ordinance 2020-6 to appropriate the funding.

7.0 PUBLIC HEARINGS

7.01 P19-39F. The request is to issue a Special Use Permit to allow an existing funeral home to expand into offering crematorium services, zoned as Community Commercial Zoning District (CC), located at 3890 Raeford Road (Tax Map No. 0417-60-9625) south of Raeford Road and east of Faison Avenue, .989± acres and being the property of Cunningham Properties of Fayetteville, LLC, represented by Deborah Cunningham.

MOTION: Council Member Wright moved to excuse Mayor Colvin from

participating on this item.

SECOND: Council Member Arp VOTE: UNANIMOUS (9-0)

Ms. Jennifer Baptiste, Senior Planner, presented this item and stated this property is the current site of Cunningham & Sons Funeral Home whose primary business is to offer funeral related services to the general public. The owners of the property are seeking to expand the current service usage to include crematory services. On September 10, 2019, the Zoning Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval of the Special Use Permit (SUP). The SUP must meet the following findings of facts:

- (1) The special use will comply with all applicable standards in Section 30-4.C, Use-Specific Standards;
- (2) The special use is compatible with the character of surrounding lands and the uses permitted in the zoning district(s) of surrounding lands;
- (3) The special use avoids significant adverse impact on surrounding lands regarding service delivery, parking, loading, odors, noise, glare, and vibration;
- (4) The special use is configured to minimize adverse effects, including visual impacts of the proposed use on adjacent lands;
- (5) The special use avoids significant deterioration of water and air resources, wildlife habitat, scenic resources, and other natural resources;
- (6) The special use maintains safe ingress and egress onto the site and safe road conditions around the site;

- (7) The special use allows for the protection of property values and the ability of neighboring lands to develop the uses permitted in the zoning district; and
- (8) The special use complies with all other relevant City, State, and Federal laws and regulations.

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time. The public hearing was opened.

Ms. Deborah Cunningham, 3809 Raeford Road, Fayetteville, NC, stated she is the applicant and asked Council to approve the Special Use Permit request.

There being no one further to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Discussion ensued.

MOTION:

Council Member Dawkins moved to approve the Special Use Permit (SUP) to allow an existing funeral home within the Community Commercial (CC) District to expand services to offer crematory services on the subject property as depicted on the attached site plan, as presented by staff, based on the standards of the City's development code and the evidence presented during this hearing. And that the application is consistent with applicable plans because (1) the development is located in a Community Commercial district, (2) that this use complies with the findings listed below, and (3) the proposed permit is in the public interest because the proposed SUP does fit with the character of the area. If approved, this Special Use Permit shall become effective ten days after its approval by the City Council, which is November 7, 2019. The SUP shall expire one year from its effective date if a building permit is not issued within that time. All eight findings of fact have been met.
