Mr. Kemberle Braden, Police Chief, presented the Police Department 2023 Second Quarter Report with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and reported on Crime Statistics, Crime Trend Analysis, Crime Fighting Strategies, Community Engagement, Death Investigations, Homicide Analysis, Aggravated Assault, Domestic Violence, Domestic Violence Services, Property Crimes, Juvenile Crime, Pro-active Police Actions, Opioid Epidemic, Drug Seizures, Federal Partnerships, Internal Affairs, License Plate Reader Technology, Traffic Fatalities, Traffic Stop Data, Homelessness/Mental Health Responses, Staffing, Employee Retention, Community Watch Groups, and Community Engagement.

Dr. Perkins, Police Chaplain, presented information on the programs administered by the Faith in Action group.

# 9.0 PUBLIC HEARINGS (Public & Legislative Hearings)

9.01 AX23-03: Slocomb @ Bethune, LLC, is petitioning to annex into the corporate limits of the City of Fayetteville one non-contiguous parcel totaling 2.95 ± acres. This parcel is located on the eastern side of Ramsey Street at 133 Bethune Drive and can be further identified by PIN # 0541-29-7074 and REID # 0541297074000.

Mr. Demetrios Moutos, Planner I, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated Slocomb @ Bethune, LLC, is petitioning to annex into the corporate limits of the City of Fayetteville and initially zone one parcel, a total of 2.95 ± acres, to Community Commercial (CC). This parcel is located on the eastern side of Ramsey Street at 133 Bethune Drive and can be further identified by PIN # 0541-29-7074 and REID # 0541297074000.

The site is currently zoned as Planned Commercial District [C(P)] under the Cumberland County zoning district map. The petitioner has requested to initially zone the parcel to Community Commercial (CC). The community commercial district accommodates the proposed use as well as a broad range of other commercial use types. The Zoning Commission has recommended approval of the requested map amendment.

According to the Future Land Use Map, this parcel has been identified for development with neighborhood-scale commercial uses, including smaller-scale multi-family and attached and small lot single-family, under the Neighborhood Mixed Use (NMU) designation. The Community Commercial (CC) district allows for uses that fit within this category of land uses. As this parcel is located in the City of Fayetteville's Municipal Influence Area (MIA), the connection to PWC sewer requires that the parcel be annexed into the corporate limits, City Council Policy No. 150.2. The petitioner is requesting annexation in order to connect to PWC sewer.

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time. There being no one to speak, the public hearing was opened and closed.

#### **10.0 EVIDENTIARY HEARINGS**

10.01 SUP23-07: The issuing of a Special Use Permit for monitored electrified fencing in a Community Commercial zoning district, located at 4514 Bragg Boulevard (REID # 0418468673000) and being

# the property of WSWN Investments LLC, represented by Danny Pitts, AMAROK, LLC.

Ms. Heather Eckhardt, Planner II, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated in 2012, Fayetteville's City Council amended its development code to allow electrified fencing under certain circumstances with a Special Use Permit in the CC -Community Commercial zoning district. This application does meet the standards for such uses. The applicant asserts that this type of security fencing is needed where their business is located, due to significant losses and multiple break ins. The design required by the UDO for these types of fences substantially lowers the visibility of such fences. Several of these fences have been approved since the ordinance was amended.

For a motion to approve, all six findings below must be met:

- The special use complies with all applicable standards in Section 30-4.C, Use-Specific Standards;
- (2) The special use will be in harmony with the area in which it is located;
- (3) The special use will not materially endanger the public health or safety if located where proposed and developed according to the plan as submitted and approved;
- (4) The special use is in general conformity with the City's adopted land use plans and policies;
- (5) The special use will not substantially injure the value of the abutting land, or the special use is a public necessity; and
- (6) The special use complies with all other relevant City, State, and Federal laws and regulations.

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time. The public hearing was opened.

Ms. Cindy Williams, 550 Assembly Street, Columbia, SC, appeared in favor.

There being no one further to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Discussion ensued.

Council Member Haire moved to approve the Special Use Permit MOTION: (SUP) to allow the installation of a monitored electrified fence in a Community Commercial zoning district subject to the conditions identified and the submitted site plans and conforming to the current Unified Development Ordinance standards as depicted on the site plan, as presented by staff, based on the standards of the City's development code and the evidence presented during this hearing. And that the application is consistent with the applicable plans because (1) the development is located in a Community Commercial (CC) zoning district; (2) the fence will be placed behind the existing chain link fence, making the chain link fencing a buffer protecting pets, children, and passersby from accidental contact; and (3) the proposed permit is in the public interest because the proposed SUP does fit with the character of the area and will help protect the assets of this business.

If approved, this Special Use Permit shall become effective with the approval of the Order of Findings by the City

Council. The SUP shall expire one year from its effective date if a building permit is not issued within that time. SECOND: Council Member Ingram VOTE: UNANIMOUS (10-0)
