### 1.0 CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Robertson called the meeting to order.

# 2.0 INVOCATION

Mayor Robertson presented Certificates of Achievement to members of the Jack Britt High School Wrestling Team and coaches for winning the State 4A Wrestling Championship.

6.02 Capital Reserve Fund Amendment 2015-2 and Capital Project Ordinance 2015-20 to fund Phase V Annexation Areas 18-19 Water and Sewer Installations

Council adopted Capital Reserve Fund Amendment 2015-2 to implement PWC's Amendment No. 13 to the Annexation Phase V Reserve Fund from inception through FY 2015, and to adopt Capital Project Ordinance 2015-20 to establish the initial budget for Annexation Phase V – Areas 18 through 19.

# 6.03 Capital Project Fund Ordinance 2015-21 [Airport Improvements – Customer Facility Charge (CFC)]

This capital project ordinance will appropriate \$25,000.00 of collected CFC revenues for special support services to be provided by our airport engineer (Talbert and Bright, Inc.).

6.04 Bid recommendation for the Butler-Warner Generation Plant Heater Recovery Steam Generator (HRSG) Life Extension Project to awarded to Waco, Inc., the lowest responsive, responsible bidder, in the total amount of \$761,506.04.

# 6.05 Capital Project Fund Ordinance 2015-22 (Runway 10/28 Rehabilitation)

This capital project ordinance will appropriate \$246,740.00 of local Airport funds to begin the design phase of the project.

# 6.06 Capital Project Fund Ordinance 2015-23 (Airline Terminal Improvement)

The source of funding will be \$55,000.00 transferred from the Airport Operating Fund.

# 6.07 Budget Ordinance Amendment 2015-9 (Emergency Telephone System Fund)

This budget ordinance amendment will appropriate a \$27,998.00 transfer from the General Fund to the Emergency Telephone System Fund to reimburse that fund for expenditures incurred in Fiscal Year 2014 that were subsequently determined to be ineligible for use of State E911 funds. Additionally, the budget ordinance amendment will appropriate \$486,869.00 from fund balance in the Emergency Telephone System Fund to allow for the recording of expenditures for 800 MHz radio equipment to be received in the current fiscal year for which financing proceeds were received in Fiscal Year 2014.

# 6.08 Budget Ordinance Amendment 2015-10 (General Fund and Environmental Services Fund)

This budget ordinance amendment will appropriate \$29,000.00 of auction proceeds and an additional \$271,000.00 transfer from the General Fund to fund the increased projected expenditures in the Environmental Services Fund. To fund the increased transfer from the General Fund, the budget ordinance amendment will appropriate an additional \$271,000.00 of sales tax revenues.

# 6.10 Award Contract for Alterations to the Fayetteville City Hall Third Floor

Council Member Arp pulled this item for discussion and a separate vote. He stated he has three reasons for pulling this item; the item appears on the consent without any fore prep, this item represents a 20 percent cost increase over the original project estimate and we continue to have contracts bid and awarded to companies outside of our community, and finally, why are we going to spend \$1.5 million when there was a memo (dated April 1, 2015, from the City Manager's office) stating we would have a \$1.6 million budget shortfall, based on the new house bill; if we have a projected shortfall and do not know what the outcome of our budgetary issues are, we should wait until we can define what our budgetary issues are.

Council Member Mohn stated we need to be aware, next year staff will be asking for about \$1.6 million in the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for the second floor renovations, and that estimate could run over as this one has. We are approximately 60 days away from approving the new budget, and I think the timing is not right, we should wait and see what the General Assembly does with the new bill, and we should encourage local contractors to bid on this project.

Council Member Colvin asked Mr. Kristoff Bauer, Deputy City Manager, how many bids were received for the project. Mr. Bauer stated there were three bids received on March 26, 2015, as follows:

Mr. Bauer stated the bid amounts listed include the base bid and all alternates. A total of six contractors requested plans and specifications for this project, with three contractors submitting bids. PRO Construction will be utilizing a minority subcontractor for 12 percent of the work on this project. Additionally, PRO Construction will be utilizing local contractors for the mechanical and plumbing work for this project.

Council Member Colvin stated folks in Fayetteville voted for the Council to help improve the economy and asked what we are doing, what is staffs' goal to raise the level of participation of local contractors to bid on projects. Mr. Bauer stated we are paying attention to who is bidding, but we do not have the legal opportunity to restrict bidding to local bidders at this time.

Council Member Colvin stated there are other communities that utilize a project manager or developer in our case the city serves as that, if we allow a project manager we would have more flexibility. Mr. Bauer stated we will definitely research the resources of the opportunity you have addressed, and see if this is something that could be used in this community.

Council Member Wright asked the City Manager what are the priorities for the renovations of City Hall. Mr. Ted Voorhees, City Manager, stated this building was purposed for a City Hall from a prior use 25 years ago. The building is deficient in certain ADA compliance; the heating, ventilation and HVAC is inadequate, some areas of the building have exposed ducts; Council does not have adequate space to conduct meetings; and the first floor is not customer service friendly, it looks like a bureaucratic maze; our goal is to rectify these problems. The funding for the project is a one-time funding; I do not recommend we use this funding to support ongoing expenses or support a permanent change in our revenue. Council Member Wright stated he

also is in favor of supporting local.

Council Member McDougald asked if the new Economic Development Department could assist local companies with the bidding processes; we want to grow local business.

Mayor Pro Tem Davy stated we are working on a live bid that is good for 60 days, I do not think it is fair to penalize those that have already gone through this bid process. We should have a user friendly building that is ADA compliant, and not have employees working in areas with exposed ducts.

Council Member Crisp stated if we do not approve this bid, the third floor (which is gutted) will sit vacant until we do decide; Council already did decide when they appropriated the funds for this project. Is it fair to our citizens to put this project on hold, when the money was already appropriated for this one-time expenditure.

Council Member Arp stated we owe it to our citizens to not manufacture a budgetary crisis. We know there are going to be budgetary impacts from the legislative action on the PWC Charter, the Privilege License change, and State Sales Tax we have to renegotiate with the County. Before we ever discuss a hiring freeze we should table this item until we realize these budgetary issues.

MOTION: Council Member Arp moved to table this item until we can answer the budgetary issues.

**SECOND:** Council Member Colvin

Mayor Pro Tem Davy stated she wanted to make sure everyone understands that we are talking about two separate budgets. This project is funding from the current budget, the issues Council Member Arp has addressed are for next year's budget. The citizens deserve an ADA compliant building.

Council Member Crisp stated he agreed with the alert memo from the City Manager, it is wise to give a warning to staff and prepare for a worse case scenario.

Council Member Colvin stated his main concern is that the money for this project will be sent to Jacksonville, North Carolina, and not here in Fayetteville.

Council Member Arp stated he has been in support of renovations to City Hall, although he is not in favor of moving this project forward for a multitude of reasons that he has stated.

Mayor Pro Tem Davy stated the City Manager's memorandum was a recommendation, which is not the same as an action going into effect.

Council Member McDougald stated it is inappropriate to put this item on hold; it is time to move forward, it is childish and immature to pull something like this because you do not like or agree with something that has been done.

Council Member Mohn stated staff will be asking for \$1.62 million next month for the next phase.

Mayor Robertson asked Council Member Arp to restate his motion.

RESTATED MOTION: Council Member Arp moved to table the award of the contract for alterations to the Fayetteville City Hall third floor, until we have disclosed and discovered all the budgetary impacts we are facing.

SECOND: Council Member Colvin seconded the motion and made a friendly amendment that the project be rebid during the tabling of the item.

Council Member Arp accepted the friendly amendment and restated the motion.

RESTATED MOTION: Council Member Arp moved to table the award of the contract for alterations to the Fayetteville City Hall third floor for 90 days until we can clear the budgetary issues.

**SECOND: Council Member Colvin** 

VOTE: FAILED by a vote of 5 in favor (Council Members Jensen, Arp, Robertson, Colvin and Mohn) to 5 in opposition (Council Members Davy, McDougald, Hurst, Crisp, and Wright)

Council Member Crisp requested to call for a revote on the previous motion.

MOTION: Council Member Arp moved to table the award of the contract for alterations to the Fayetteville City Hall third floor for 90 days until we can clear the budgetary issues.

**SECOND: Council Member Colvin** 

VOTE: PASSED by a vote of 6 in favor to 4 in opposition (Council Members Davy, McDougald, Hurst, and Wright)

# 7.0 PUBLIC FORUM

Ms. Angie Wells, 9504 Fairlane Drive, Charlotte, NC 28214, expressed concerns regarding communication workers potential job losses due to the proposed Trans-Pacific Partnership.

Mr. David Gibson, 517 Greensboro Street, Fayetteville, NC 28301, expressed concerns regarding the City purchase of his property.

Ms. Susan Bullock, 5612 Toggle Avenue, Fayetteville, NC 28306, expressed concerns regarding trailer parking in front yards in her neighborhood. Ms. Bullock provided photographs of the offending vehicle parking.

Mr. Christopher Tober, no address provided, provided suggestions for fundraisers to assist the homeless.

Ms. Kris Veno, 3286 Yarmouth Drive, Fayetteville, NC 28306, expressed concerns regarding two vacant positions at the Dorothy Gilmore Center.

# 8.0 OTHER ITEMS OF BUSINESS

# 8.01 Update on PWC Audit Deficiencies

Mr. Dwight Miller, PWC Chief Financial Officer, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated two significant control deficiencies were identified as part of the fiscal 2014 audit; system access and Segregation of Duties (SOD); timely closing and properly accounting of work orders and capital projects in Oracle Work and Asset Management (WAM). The Public Works Commission as part of its remediation efforts engaged Cherry Bekaert Risk Advisory Services and Baker Tilly to assist in mitigating the identified deficiencies. Mr. Miller stated they have formalized and will place in service a Periodic Access Review (PAR). We expect the PAR will be in place sometime in May 2015. The Risk Advisory staff is also working on this project. Mr. Miller provided a spreadsheet of the WAM milestones.

Council Member Colvin asked Mr. Miller to restate the two deficiencies. Mr. Miller responded it was the system access and controls and need to have access to certain areas; and a proper segregation of duties, and timely closings of work orders.

Council Member Crisp asked if there was still a backlog on some of the work orders. Mr. Miller responded that was correct, as not everything has been properly recorded.

Mayor Pro Tem Davy asked for the PowerPoint to be e-mailed to the Council, as the information was not included in the agenda packet.

Council Member Wright stated he understands there is a backlog and you have a timeline to clear the backlog, and asked what is in place to meet the deadlines. Mr. Miller responded they have dedicated six employees to work on the recordings.

# **PUBLIC HEARING**

Ms. Karen McDonald, City Attorney, stated Ms. Patricia Gibson who had signed up to speak at a public hearing, and was asked to step out to speak with Ms. Rochelle Small-Toney, Deputy City Manager, has returned to this meeting and requests permission to address the Council.

Ms. Patricia Gibson, 517 Greensboro Street, Fayetteville, NC 28301, stated she is speaking on behalf of her father, Mr. David Gibson, in reference to the City purchasing his property, and asked the City compensate her father in a fair and just manner.
