Council Member Hurst announced the Operation Cease Fire event taking place at Pine Forest High School on the evening of September 19, 2015.

Mayor Robertson and Council Member Jensen presented Certificates of Excellence to the members of the Methodist University Men's Golf Team: Mr. Charlie Maness, Mr. Aaron Purviance, Mr. Mason Stutler, and Mr. Jeff Wells. FRIENDLY AMENDMENT:

SECOND:

Council Member Colvin made a friendly amendment to vote on all recommendations with the exception of appointment.

Council Member Hurst accepted and Council Member Crisp did not accept the friendly amendment.

FAILED by a vote of 4 in favor to 6 in opposition (Council Members Robertson, Colvin, McDougald, Arp, Wright, Jensen)

Council Member Mohn asked to verify that every single person recommended by the Appointment Committee was disapproved. Mayor Robertson stated that is correct.

MOTION: Council Member Colvin movedto approve all names recommended by the Appointment Committee with the exception of the PWC appointment, and to vote on the PWC appointment separately.

Council Member Wright

PASSED by a vote of 7 in favor to 3 in opposition (Council Members Hurst, Mohn, and Crisp)

Council Member Crisp stated Council is currently in dispute with the PWC and that is why he wanted a separate vote.

Council Member Mohn stated on August 14, 2015, the Deputy City Clerk e-mailed the Appointment Committee binder that contained the 66 applications for various positions, is it Council policy to accept nominations from the floor that are included in the packet and are timely. Ms. Pamela Megill, City Clerk, responded that a deadline is established with each appointment cycle to allow staff time to coordinate the packet that can be in excess of 300 pages, and to provide Council with ample time to review the applications.

Council Member Crisp stated that although there may not be a written procedure, it had been his experience over the past several years that nominations are only considered from those that have been submitted within the announced timeline. He also stated if we accept nominations from persons that do not have a current application on file, we are setting a dangerous precedent.

Council Member Colvin asked how we can bind this current Council to an unwritten rule or policy that was established back in the 1990s.

Council Member Wright stated his concern is the Appointment Committee chooses members based on merit yet, we have a policy that allows for nominations from the floor, because there is no policy or anything on writing, how can this Council operate with unwritten rules.

Council Member Crisp stated if an applicant is notified their application will not be considered as it did not meet the deadline, and then the Council considers and appoints someone to a board or commission whose application was late, that person may well accuse the

City of bias and prejudicial treatment, which could end up in a court of law.

Council Member Hurst stated the system for appointing board and commission members years ago was virtually chaos and gave way to political patronage. A new system was developed and implemented in 2007 and this system does and has worked well. We have deadlines and timelines that are set by the Clerk's office and everyone is aware. Council Member Hurst further stated he sees disregarding the deadline and timeline as an attack on his leadership of the Appointment Committee. We work hard to make sure the best qualified are appointed to our Boards and Commissions.

Council Member Mohn stated he had 30 days to review all seven applications for the PWC appointment and no time to review this additional application that was placed in front of him for the first time at the dinner meeting this evening. The published deadline was July 31, 2015, and stated he would not consider an application that was not submitted until August 14, 2015.

Council Member McDougald thanked the City Clerk and Council Member Hurst for all their hard work with the appointment process and further stated the recommendation should come from the will of the collective Council, whether or not we pull someone from the audience.

Council Member Colvin stated this board should make the final recommendation, and should not circumvent the democratic process by way of a committee.

Council Member Jensen stated Council Member Hurst does an excellent job as Chair of the Appointment Committee, but we have unchartered waters when it comes to the appointments for PWC; I do not think the Appointment Committee should make a recommendation for this specific board.

Council Member Arp asked if there is a pressing reason to suspend the vote on this issue this evening, this is an important decision this Council has to make, and there is no harm in tabling this item.

MOTION: Council Member Arp moved to table the vote on the PWC appointment until the September 28, 2015, City Council regular meeting.

The motion died due to lack of a second.

Mayor Pro Tem Davy asked Council Member Arp if his reason to delay the vote is because we are waiting on the General Assembly to make a decision, and if that is so, the General Assembly does not wait on municipalities to make a decision; this nomination process should not be any different from any other nomination.

Council Member Arp stated there is a pending opportunity the General Assembly may give us an amended charter and if they do we may need to appoint two members to the PWC, so there is validity on waiting to make this appointment.

Council Member Crisp stated we have three names that have been mentioned--Lynn Green, Juanita Gonzalez, and Evelyn Shaw--we do not need to delay this appointment.

Council Member Hurst stated it is unfair to consider Ms. Shaw as a nomination because her application was late, when we have other applicants that also applied late, and are not being considered this evening.

MOTION: Council Member McDougald moved to consider Juanita Gonzalez, Lynn Greene, and Evelyn Shaw for appointment to the Public Works Commission.

SECOND: Council Member Wright

Council Member Hurst stated this Council is setting tonight that there are no deadlines; we are changing the timeline we have adhered to, Council has hand-picked who they want to vote on.

Council Member Jensen asked if we are only considering women candidates to fill a position currently held by a woman, and asked if the other late filing candidates would have been considered if they were women.

Council Member Colvin stated for this Council to be bound by unwritten rules is ludicrous; thankfully this is a democratic process, we do not need a filtering process.

Council Member Mohn stated after this Council working together for 22 months, this item is the most disjoined and stated he would like to make a privileged motion.

MOTION: Council Member Mohn moved to adjourn.

SECOND: Council Member Crisp

VOTE: FAILED by a vote of 5 in favor to 5 in opposition (Council Members Robertson, Colvin, McDougald, Davy and Wright)

Council Member Wright stated the Council has nominated from the floor in the past, and stated he believes the vote needs to take place and not be delayed.

Council Member McDougald moved to consider Juanita Gonzalez, Lynn Greene, and Evelyn Shaw for appointment to the Public Works Commission.

SECOND: Council Member Wright

VOTE: PASSED by a vote of 6 in favor to 4 in opposition (Council Members Hurst, Davy, Mohn, and Crisp)

Discussion ensued to vote on each applicant individually.

8.02 Code Amendment for parking standards for trailers, campers and recreational vehicles in residential zoning districts

Mr. Scott Shuford, Development Services Director, presented this item and stated regulation of trailers and recreational vehicles has been a challenge for City Council for years. In 2008 the Council required all RVs to be parked in the rear yard or off site with some exceptions for temporary use. Most recently, in November 2014 staff proposed changes addressing utility trailers in a set of miscellaneous changes; the change would have allowed one single-axle trailer to be parked in the front yard if there was no reasonable access to the rear yard. That portion of the miscellaneous changes was pulled and eventually denied in December 2014. City Council discussed the topic three more times in April and May 2015. Staff believes the amendment

represents the direction from Council in May 2015 to allow recreational vehicles and single-axle boats and utility trailers in front and corner side yards provided they are parked on asphalt or concrete surfaces, with multi-axle boats or utility trailers able to be considered and allowed through a waiver process. A chart summarizing standards in some other North Carolina communities is included in the packet. Existing regulations, located in three different chapters of the City Code, were also presented for reference along with the draft amendment. A fourth section, Section 30-5.A, limits the allowed parking area (see amendment adopted August 10, Since the total parking area is limited, staff does not propose a maximum number of vehicles allowed. The Planning Commission heard from one speaker at the public hearing on July 21, 2015. He preferred the initial amendment as better for neighborhoods, but believes the current draft will still help as some standards are needed. There were no speakers at the City Council hearing August 24, 2015, and given the late hour, the City Council tabled the item to the next meeting. Issues include where and on what surfaces, how many, condition, and what types and sizes of vehicles. Concerns expressed at the public hearings included the negative impacts on adjacent property values and quality of life when outsized trucks or RVs and poorly maintained trailers with miscellaneous equipment piled on them were evident in front and side yards in a neighborhood. Others noted the benefits of having ready access to the repair or yard maintenance equipment for small businesses run from the home. The Joint Appearance Commission recommended limited parking of trailers or RVs, of modest size and only one, in the front or corner side yards. The process for requests to park multi-axle trailers/vehicles in front or side yards should include opportunities for adjacent property owners to comment. It cannot be viewed as a hardship, so it needs a process other than a variance or appeal to the Board of Adjustment. The Neighborhood Compatibility Permit appears most appropriate. involves notices to adjacent property owners, a hearing at the Planning Commission, and a relatively quick decision-making process, with compatibility with the community as a primary goal and the ability to set conditions to mitigate specific impacts.

Council Member Arp asked if this change in the code is more restrictive than the code the City of Raleigh currently adheres to. Mr. Shuford responded it is similar to what is allowed in Raleigh.

Council Member Crisp asked under this proposed ordinance would it be permissible to park a 20-foot recreational vehicle on cinder blocks if the driveway has an incline. Mr. Shuford responded that would be permissible, but the vehicle would still need to be operable.
