The following bids were received for the Stormwater Greenscape portion of the project:

Browe Construction, Inc., Smithfield, NC\$1,359,807.95 Lanier Construction Co., Snow Hill, NC\$1,866,811.33

The lowest bid received was over the City's budgeted amount for the project and will require a CPOA of \$115,000.00. Browe Construction, Inc., proposes to utilize minority subcontractors for 26 percent of the work and utilize local subcontractors and local suppliers for 45 percent of the work.

6.07 Award Contract for the Purchase of Miscellaneous Police Vehicles

Formal bids for the purchase of miscellaneous police vehicles were originally scheduled to be opened on October 15, 2015; however, no bids were received. A re-advertisement was published and a second bid opening was held on November 4, 2015. Lafayette Ford, Fayetteville, North Carolina, was the sole bidder responding for the vehicles listed below. Staff recommends that Council approve a contract for the award of the following police vehicles from Lafayette Ford, Fayetteville, North Carolina:

- 6 Pursuit Rated Marked Sport Utility Vehicles \$28,800 each Total for 6 = \$172,800.00
- 5 Pursuit Rated Unmarked Sport Utility Vehicles \$27,615 each Total for 5 = \$138,075.00
- 1 Pursuit Rated Marked Sport Utility Vehicle with Kennel \$28,250 each Total for 1 = \$28,250.00
- 9 Full-Size Unmarked Police Cars
 \$26,527 each Total for 9 = \$238,743.00
- 12 Full-Size Marked Police Cars \$26,327 each Total for 12 = \$315,924.00

The total recommended contract amount for the purchase of police vehicles from Lafayette Ford is \$893,792.00. This amount is for the purchase of the vehicles only.

7.0 REPORTS FROM BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

7.01 Airport Commission Annual Report

Mr. Donald Warren, Airport Commission Chair, provided an overview of the Airport Commission annual report, and stated the airport operates 15 to 16 flights per day, depending on the schedule.

8.0 STAFF REPORTS

8.01 Fayetteville Police Department 2015 Year in Review and 2016 Outlook Presentation

Mr. Harold Medlock, Police Chief, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation. Chief Medlock stated with the new direction of becoming more connected with our community, the new slogan is "one agency, one community, one family, ONE". Chief Medlock provided statistics on crimes committed in the City of Fayetteville, and stated total violent crime has an increase of 14.90 percent, property crimes have an overall decrease of 7.40 percent. Chief Medlock provided an overview of the new initiatives.

Council Member Arp stated he is encouraged by the numbers and asked if there were correlating circumstances that have led to the increase in aggravated assaults. Chief Medlock responded he does not think we have turf gang warfare in our City, and stated he thinks most of the shootings are from people disrespecting one another; it's people with anger management problems, this is what is driving our numbers. Our officers now return to domestic violence instances to follow up and provide literature to the people involved in the incidents.

Council Member Arp asked how the red light camera program was going. Chief Medlock responded he would like to see more red light cameras in our City.

Council Member Jensen stated we are way ahead of our time, with you as our Chief and our Police Department.

Council Member Wright thanked Chief Medlock for the great report, and stated he is very impressed, no police shootings, you are working hard with community efforts.

Council Member deViere asked if there was anything Council can do from a policy standpoint to help the Police Department and you as we go into 2016.

Council Member McDougald stated calls to him to complain about criminal activity in his district have gone down significantly, and thanked Chief Medlock and his officers for the concentration in this area.

Council Member Crisp asked the status of the recruitment of sworn officers. Chief Medlock stated the new class starts February 22, 2016, with 20 cadets, they should be trained and on the street by this time next year. Council Member Crisp thanked Chief Medlock and the Police Department for their tireless efforts.

Mayor Robertson stated he and the Council stand behind Chief Medlock and the Police Department and recognize what an outstanding job they all are doing, and appreciate the hard work.

8.02 City of Fayetteville FY 2016 Resident Survey Report

Ms. Rebecca Rogers-Carter, Strategic Performance Analytics Director, presented this item and stated the City of Fayetteville conducted a resident survey to seek residents' input regarding current

programs and services, new initiatives and future policy. The survey is part of the City's ongoing efforts to identify and respond to resident concerns and gather input about priorities for the community. Resident surveys are an important tool in determining if programs and services are meeting residents' expectations. Resident surveys also bring residents into the public decision making process in the early stages of the strategic planning process. A consulting firm, ETC Institute, administered the survey to residents in the City of Fayetteville during the fall of 2015. A seven page survey instrument mailed to approximately 3000 randomly selected sample residents. Residents who had not responded to the survey by mail were contacted by phone and given the option of completing the survey by phone. The consultant received 669 survey responses which ensure the survey results have statistical significance with a precision of at least +/- 3.8 percent at the 95 percent level of confidence. The sample is statistically representative of the City's population with regard to the demographic and geographic composition of the sample. The last resident survey conducted by the City of Fayetteville occurred in 2013.

Ms. Rogers-Carter introduced Mr. Chris Tatham, CEO, ETC Institute. Mr. Tatham addressed Council via telephone. Mr. Tatham provided an overview of the resident survey report. A hard copy and electronic copy of the report was provided to Mayor and City Council. Mr. Tatham stated the FY 2016 report provided contains a summary of the methodology, major findings and comparison to FY 2013 survey results, charts showing overall results, important-satisfaction analysis that identifies potential opportunities for improvement, tables that show the results for all questions, and a copy of the survey instrument.

Discussion ensued.

9.0 PUBLIC HEARINGS

9.01 P15-37F. The issuing of a Special Use Permit for a crematory in a CC Community Commercial Zoning District and to be located at 653-657 Hillsboro Street, and being the property of Wiseman Mortuary.

Mr. Craig Harmon, Senior Planner, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated Wiseman Funeral Home wishes to build a crematory across Hillsboro Street from its current All three properties are currently zoned Community The owners of this property have requested a Special Use Commercial. Permit (SUP) for the operation of a crematory. On November 23, 2015, a rezoning was approved to change one of these properties to CC. The other two properties were already zoned Community Commercial. are no use-specific standards for this type of use. However, conditions can be imposed to improve compatibility and address site This proposed use should be a low impact specific issues. neighbors since it will only be used for the crematory. The condition of approval recommended by staff and the Zoning Commission was to limit signage to a monument style and standard wall signage (Condition is acceptable to the property owner).

Mr. Harmon stated on December 8, 2015, the Zoning Commission held a public hearing regarding this case. There was one speaker in favor and none in opposition. The Commission voted 5-0 to recommend approval. Mr. Harmon stated the SUP must meet the following findings of fact:

1. The special use complies with all applicable standards in Section 30-4.C, Use-Specific Standards;

- 2. The special use is compatible with the character of surrounding lands and the uses permitted in the zoning district(s) of surrounding lands;
- 3. The special use avoids significant adverse impact on surrounding lands regarding service delivery, parking, loading, odors, noise, glare, and vibration;
- 4. The special use is configured to minimize adverse effects, including visual impacts of the proposed use on adjacent lands;
- 5. The special use avoids significant deterioration of water and air resources, wildlife habitat, scenic resources, and other natural resources;
- 6. The special use maintains safe ingress and egress onto the site and safe road conditions around the site;
- 7. The special use allows for the protection of property values and the ability of neighboring lands to develop the uses permitted in the zoning district; and
- 8. The special use complies with all other relevant City, State, and Federal laws and regulations.

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time. The public hearing was opened.

Ms. Tryphina Wiseman, 431 Cumberland Street, Fayetteville, NC, appeared in favor and stated she was available to answer questions.

There being no one further to speak, the public hearing was closed.

MOTION: Council Member deViere moved to approve the Special Use Permit as presented by staff with the conditions noted and upon finding the proposed use meets all eight standards for a Special Use Permit.
