#### 1.0 CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Robertson called the meeting to order.

### 2.0 INVOCATION

The invocation was offered by Captain Matt Trantham of the Salvation Army.

### 3.0 PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag was led by Mayor Robertson and City Council.

### 4.0 ANNOUNCEMENTS AND RECOGNITION

Mayor Robertson presented former Mayor Bill Hurley with the first "Lafayette Award" for his contribution and service over many years to improving the City of Fayetteville. A video to illustrate the many projects Mayor Hurley participated in was played. Mayor Hurley stated he had a spiritual calling to get involved with his community and thanked the Council for what they are doing now, for carrying the mantel; we are really on the move, we have come a long way through a lot of diversities, and we should always take pride in what we do.

- 6.02 P17-02F The rezoning of property from SF-6 Single-Family Residential Zoning to LC Light Commercial Zoning, located at 3211 Natal Street and being the property of OSALIE CROWE. (Zoning Commission, owner and staff have all agreed on a more restrictive NC Neighborhood Commercial Zoning District).
- 6.03 P17-05F The initial zoning of property from M(P) Manufacturing in Cumberland County's jurisdiction to CC Community Commercial Zoning District, located between the intersections of Glensford Drive and Cliffdale Road and Glensford Drive and Red Tip Road and being the property of Sharlene R. Budget Ordinance Amendment 2017-20 will appropriate \$482,930.00 of additional General Fund fund balance to supplement the remaining balance of \$517,070.00 from the PWC funding to provide for the \$1,000,000.00 General Fund upfront funding commitment for the stadium.

# 6.05 Budget Ordinance Amendment 2017-19 (Emergency Telephone System Fund)

Budget Ordinance Amendment 2017-19 will appropriate \$20,000.00 of Emergency Telephone Systems Fund fund balance for computer and office equipment to be used in the 911 Communications Center.

# 6.06 Adoption of Capital Project Ordinance 2017-49 for the Restoration of the North Carolina Veterans Park

Capital Project Ordinance 2017-49 will appropriate \$328,452.00 to fund costs associated with the restoration of North Carolina Veterans Park (NCVP) due to damages sustained during Hurricane Matthew. The park and building restoration, and building contents replacement, are expected to be funded through insurance proceeds (\$163,452.00), reimbursement from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) (\$123,750.00), and reimbursement from the State of North Carolina, Department of Public Safety (NC DPS) (\$41,250.00).

# 6.07 Adoption of Capital Project Ordinances 2017-51 (Mirror Lake Dam Reconstruction) and 2017-52 (Devonwood Lower Dam Reconstruction)

Capital Project Ordinances 2017-51 and 2017-52 will appropriate anticipated funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the North Carolina Department of Public Safety (NC DPS) to establish project funding for the reconstruction of Mirror Lake Dam (\$2,286,810.00) and Devonwood Lower Dam (\$3,279,200.00), respectively. Both dams sustained considerable damage during Hurricane Matthew.

# 6.08 Adoption of Capital Project Ordinance Amendment 2017-50 for the Downtown Skate Park (Parks and Recreation Bond Project)

Capital Project Ordinance 2017-50 will appropriate \$300,000.00 of initial funding for the Downtown Skate Park for costs associated with land acquisition and design. The appropriation for this project is to be funded from proceeds of the first Parks & Recreation bond issuance.

### 6.09 Request to award the contract for the purchase and installation of an ornamental steel fence at the Airport to Seegars Fence, the lowest, responsive responsible bidder, in the amount of \$97,036.00.

Formal bids for the purchase and installation of an ornamental steel fence at the Airport were received March 3, 2017. Bids were received as follows:

### 6.10 Award Contract for the Resurface Various Streets 2017-Phase II to Barnhill Contracting Company, Fayetteville, NC, the lowest responsive, responsible bidder, in the total amount of \$1,522,518.30.

Resurface Various Streets-2017-Phase II consists of resurfacing 15 streets (approximately 3.55 miles) and milling and resurfacing 6 streets (approximately 1.42 miles). The work includes, but is not limited to, removing and replacing curb and gutter, installing and retrofitting handicap ramps, utility adjustments, milling, cutting out and patching areas, placing leveling and overlay courses, installation of traffic loops. The project was first advertised for bids to be opened on March 15, 2017; however, only two bids were received. Therefore, in accordance with North Carolina General Statutes, which require three bids in order to open the first advertisement, the project was re-advertised and bids were opened on March 23, 2017. Bids were received as follows:

### 6.11 Adoption of Budget Ordinance Amendment 2017-21 and Capital Project Ordinance 2017-53 for Downtown Redevelopment Site Infrastructure

The Downtown Redevelopment project includes three specific City funded elements--the stadium, a parking garage, and site infrastructure. Funding is needed to progress with the third element and Council is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment 2017-21 to appropriate \$110,000.00 from General Fund fund balance and Capital Project Ordinance 2017-53 to authorize and track funding for this element of the project.

### 7.0 REPORTS FROM BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

#### 7.01 Linear Park - Reports from Boards and Commission

Mr. Harry Shaw, Linear Park Corporation Chair, presented the annual report. Mr. Shaw thanked the Council for their long-term commitment and devotion to the Linear Park and trail. Mr. Shaw thanked the Parks and Recreation staff and Senator Meredith for his assistance with securing the grant to providing funding for cleaning up the debris in the creek.

### 7.02 Annual Report of the Fayetteville-Cumberland Human Relations Commission

Ms. Shiela Cuffee, Fayetteville-Cumberland Human Relations Commission Chair, presented the annual report with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation, and provided an overview of the programs and services offered. Ms. Cuffee thanked the Council for strongly endorsing our mission.

# 7.03 Annual Report, Fayetteville-Cumberland Parks and Recreation Commission

Mr. William McNiell, Fayetteville-Cumberland Parks and Recreation Commission Chair, presented the annual report and also stated most of the members of the Commission are fairly new, and have been attending several training sessions. Commission members have been out in the community; showing support for the City parks bond to improve the quality of life in our communities. Mr. McNiell stated the Commission is working very hard on the ten-year master plan.

### 8.0 PUBLIC HEARINGS

#### 8.01 Annexation of the Williams Property

Mr. David Nash, Senior Planner, presented this item and stated the property requested for annexation is owned by Sharlene R. Williams (as Trustee of the Sharlene R. Williams Revocable Trust). The property is currently vacant, and it is completely surrounded by the City as shown on the vicinity map and legal description map. It is expected that the land will be developed in the future as commercial, but City staff is not sure of the type and timing of commercial development. PWC water and sewer will be needed for the future development. Since the property is in the Fayetteville MIA, annexation will be required, pursuant to Council Policy No. 150.2. On February 10, 2017, Ms. Williams submitted a request that the property be annexed as a contiguous area. The property consists of one tax parcel (PIN 0417-06-6874) having a size of about 5.34 acres. On April 11, 2017, the Zoning Commission held an initial zoning public hearing for this property.

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time, the public hearing was opened.

Ms. Lori Epler, 1333 Morganton Road, Fayetteville, NC 28305, appeared in favor and stated she is representing the Williams family and is here to answer any questions Council may have.

There being no one further to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Discussion ensued.

# 9.01 Adoption of Capital Project Ordinance 2017-48 (Design Phase for the Airport Public Art Project)

# 9.02 Consideration of approval of the 2017-2018 Community Development Annual Action Plan

Mr. Victor Sharpe, Community Development Director, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated annually the Community Development Department prepares an Annual Action Plan for the use of the City's allocation of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and the Home Investment Partnership Grant (HOME). The proposed 2017-2018 Annual Action Plan is the third year of the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan. The proposed 2017-2018 Annual Action Plan is being presented to City Council for consideration of approval. The Community Development Department presented this item for discussion at the City Council work sessions on December 5, 2016, and April 3, 2017. The proposed projects for the upcoming year are explained in the plan. The Annual Action Plan is based on goals and objectives of the Consolidated Plan. The goals include Decent Affordable Housing, Suitable Living Environment, and Economic Opportunities. The proposed programs and activities have been designed and established to meet the objectives of these goals. The activities proposed for the upcoming year are similar to last year. The plan includes the Target Area Revitalization Program which was an interest of the Council last year. This program was postponed to address unmet housing repair needs due to damage caused by Hurricane Matthew. As adopted last year, the Target Area Revitalization Program will focus on the Bonnie Doone and B Street/Lincoln Drive areas. A program change included in the plan is to expand the department's in-house emergency home repair program. This will be accomplished by changing the Mobile Home Urgent Repair Program to the Emergency Home Repair Program and include all eligible residential emergency/urgent repairs. A portion of the funding that has previously been managed by Fayetteville Urban Ministries would be utilized to fulfill this proposal. The Fayetteville Redevelopment Commission (FRC) held three meetings to include a public hearing to consider the plan and recommends approval of the plan that is being presented. The FRC's recommendation includes a revision to the budget that was presented by staff and previously presented to City Council. These revisions include recommending an increase of funding for CEED from \$60,000.00 to \$85,000.00 for small business consultation and an increase of funding to Veterans Empowering Veterans from \$15,000.00 to \$30,000.00 for the repair of four houses for transitional housing for veterans. The additional funding for these activities was taken from the Business Assistance Program in the amount of \$40,000.00. The FRC's changes have been incorporated into the budget being presented to City Council for approval.

Discussion ensued.

### 10.02 Hurricane Matthew Reimbursements, Vehicle Replacements, Hazard Mitigation and Golden Leaf Update

Ms. Cheryl Spivey, Chief Financial Officer, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated more than 50 City projects have been identified as possibly eligible for FEMA reimbursement. Documentation, construction bids, and other cost estimates are required by FEMA submission. Fifteen projects totaling \$6.8 million have been submitted. Projects totaling \$19.2 million have been identified for possible FEMA reimbursement.

FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program offers a choice of three options to homeowners (if determined eligible)--acquisition and demolition or "buyout", structure elevation or "housing raising", and mitigation reconstruction or "demolish and rebuild". An informational session was held on April 6, 2017, at the Cliffdale Recreation Center, with 65 residents attending.

The Golden Leaf Foundation Grants provided \$920,000.00 for the Rayconda subdivision access roadway, and \$300,000.00 for Cross Creek tree and debris removal. Staff attended a grant workshop on April 20, 2017. There are opportunities for applying for additional grants.

Discussion ensued.

Council Member Arp asked if staff had met all of the requirements for FEMA reimbursements. Ms. Spivey responded that we have to go through a process that includes a public bid package, selection process, Council authorization, and this process takes time.

Council Member Arp asked if staff has a timeline (matrix) to show the process for each project. Ms. Spivey responded that we do have a good estimated package completion date for each project.

Council Member Arp asked for the timeline to be made available to the public that shows citizens exactly where we are, with a level of detail for identifying the project, meeting the FEMA requirements, having the engineering estimate and date of the competitive bid going out. Ms. Spivey responded we can provide that level of detail, but it will take some days to put together.

Council Member Arp requested that the matrix be completed by the end of this week.

# 11.0 ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m.
