1.0 CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Robertson called the meeting to order.

The invocation was offered by Dr. Gregory Perkins, Associate Pastor with Mt. Pisqah MBC.

Council Member Jensen presented certificates from the state to the seven graduating FCYC members. Seniors Josh Jensen, Sergeant at Arms; Daqari Davis, Historian; and Charlotte Jackson, Chair, presented their "Farewell to Council".

Council Member Arp congratulated the Cape Fear Softball Girls Team and the Terry Sanford Girls Soccer Team for making it into the Regional State Tournament in their respective sports.

Mr. Douglas Hewett, City Manager, presented Mr. Kevin Arata, Corporate Communicates Director, a first place Excellence in Communications Award from the North Carolina City and County Communicators (NC3C) for the City's Hurricane Matthew Informational Campaign. The City's Corporate Communications unit promoted extensively the status of City services and weather updates using multiple platforms and methods. The judges commented that Hurricane Matthew provided a significant convergence of importance and urgency. The judges also indicated that the Fayetteville team rose to the challenge, possibly saving untold lives while also generating vast amounts of social and traditional media reach.

7.0 PUBLIC HEARINGS

7.01 Public Hearing on Proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Annual Operating Budget

Mr. Douglas Hewett, City Manager, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated this public hearing has been set to receive comments from residents regarding the annual operating budget proposed for the City for the fiscal year 2017-2018. The notice advertising the public hearing was published in The Fayetteville Observer on May 11, 2017, and the proposed budget was presented to City Council on May 8, 2017, and is available for public inspection in the office of the City Clerk. The document is also available on the City's website.

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time. The public hearing was opened.

Mr. Jerry Reinhol, 516 Deer Path Drive, Fayetteville, NC, appeared in opposition and expressed concerns regarding lack of funding for engineering studies.

There being no one further to speak, the public hearing was closed.

No action was taken.

7.02 Staff- or Commission-initiated Code changes to Chapter 30 Development Code, various sections, including supportive uses in a Business Park District, multi-axle trailer parking, residential densities in a Neighborhood Commercial District, Expiration Term for Certificate of Appropriateness, standards for temporary shipping containers, and administrative adjustments for certain utility needs.

Mr. Scott Shuford, Planning and Code Enforcement Director, introduced this item and asked if Council would like a presentation of the item.

Mayor Robertson responded we should go straight into the public hearing and asked why this item was on the agenda without going to the Parks and Recreation Bond Committee first. Mr. Shuford responded this is a Zoning amendment that went through Planning and the Commission and it is not legally required to go through a subcommittee.

Council Member Mohn stated he would like to hear the entire presentation, we have never put a zoning item to a committee; the Parks and Recreation Bond Committee is not the proper place to put a City-wide zoning item for a recommendation; this is for a business park (BP), everything staff has done up to this point is correct.

Council Member Arp moved to approve Item 7.02 with the MOTION: exception of number 1, clarifying that parks or recreational facilities in the BP district do not count toward the limitation on supportive commercial uses, and that part be sent to the Parks and Recreation Bond

Committee for review.

Council Member Jensen SECOND:

This is the advertised public hearing set for this date and time. There being no one to speak, the public hearing was opened and closed.

Discussion ensued.

Council Member Crisp stated there are too many moving parts in this item, and it needs to be broken out as separate entities. I have reservations about multi-axle trailers and I am not ready to approve any of these parts tonight.

Council Member McDougald stated he too was concerned about multiaxle trailers.

Council Member Mohn stated Council asked staff to bring text amendment items twice a year--spring and fall--rather than have multiple agenda items.

Council Member Arp stated he withdraws his motion, and will submit another motion. Council Member Jensen stated she withdraws her second.

 $\,$ Mr. Scott Shuford, Planning and Code Enforcement Director, presented this item and stated a review of the UDO to align it with new RAMP and code enforcement procedures identified one area where a minor adjustment was needed to enable the standard code enforcement timelines to apply to zoning violations. This amendment aligns the two code sections. Staff reviewed this amendment, along with an amendment to another section of the City Code and a proposed map of priority areas for blighted structure enforcement, with City Council at the May 1, 2017, work session.

7.04 Approval of a Resolution to adopt the Resiliency Element - Comprehensive Plan

Mr. Scott Shuford, Planning and Code Enforcement Director, presented this item with the aid of a PowerPoint presentation and stated Hurricane Matthew underscored a number of challenges Fayetteville faces regarding natural hazards resiliency. In addition to widespread damage to structures and infrastructure, the storm event also demonstrated that lower-income and racial-minority populations were disproportionately affected. The OEA funded a report, completed by Fayetteville State University and Creative Economic Development Consulting, regarding the community's economic well-being. That report was presented to City Council and other regional local governments in February 2017 and highlighted local overdependence on Fort Bragg and the economic resiliency challenge our community faces. The Resiliency Element identifies natural hazards, economic and social equity issues and offers strategies that can enhance community resiliency in these critical areas.
